







She is the recipient of the Zora Neale Hurston-Bessie Head Fiction Award, the Union League Civic & Arts Foundation Short Story Competition, and the Betty Shifflett/John Schultz Short Story Award. She currently resides in Chicago. Last Summer on State Street is her debut novel.

The Cursed Ones

(Ghana/UK, 2015)

In a remote Ghanaian village, a travelling reporter finds a story when a disturbed young girl is accused of witchcraft. Religious intervention is demanded but which religion: Christian or Traditional? Are the motives of spiritual leaders as pure as they should be? And how can he save her once she's sentenced to death? Based on a true story, this social problem thriller, enhanced by wrenching performances and evocative cinematography, received 13 nominations at the Africa Movie Academy Awards. The Cursed Ones "does not only highlight Africa's cultural superstitions, [but] also entices the viewer with the rich cultural heritage of the same people the film 'criticizes." (GhanaCelebrities.com)

Thursday, Nov. 17 The Souvenir

(United Kingdom, 2019)

In 1980s London, a young woman finds herself caught in an abusive romance with a heroin addict while embarking upon her film school thesis project. What makes the film uniquely powerful is its intimacy and emotional precision: it's based on the real experiences of writer-director Joanna Hogg, and the family drama is performed by Tilda Swinton alongside her daughter, newcomer Honor Swinton Byrne. Rated Best Film of 2019 by Sight and Sound magazine, The Souvenir is "achingly well-observed ... [both] the coming-of-age story of many women and a specific creative manifesto for one of modern British cinema's most singular writer-directors." (Variety)

Eyimofe/This is My Desire

(Nigeria, 2020)

Described by its filmmakers as "a reverse migration story," Eyimofe is about struggling to leave home, rather than adjusting to a new one. A hairdresser and an electrician, vaguely known to one another, each plan to leave Nigeria for Europe, only to face the brutal constraints of a social context that keeps them in their place. The story's twists and turns are as melodramatic as any Nollywood hit, but its style, captured on 16mm celluloid, evokes African Art Cinema, Italian Neo-Realism, and New Taiwanese film. Novelist Teju Cole called it "artful and luminous ... compact and intelligent ... a search for how best to live." (The New Yorker)

The Souvenir Part Two

(United Kingdom, 2021)

Soon after the events of The Souvenir, Julie finds herself traumatized by the end of her intense relationship, hiding out with her family and struggling to reconnect with her thesis project. But the irrepressible world of filmmaking - its social nature, and its exuberant embrace of being fully, stylishly alive, proves to be cathartic. "Looser, wilder, funnier, and almost euphorically uplifting," this sequel's "own journey from claustrophobic tragedy to vibrant social comedy is no less exhilarating, or moving, than the heroine's. Art and life speedily evolve as one, the possibility of renewal and change demonstrated in practice." (The A.V. Club)
